The Board of Chosen Freeholders of the County of Warren met in Regular Session in its offices in the Wayne Dumont, Jr. Administration Building, Belvidere, New Jersey on October 23, 2019 at 7:00 p.m.

The meeting was called to order by Director Sarnoski and upon roll call, the following members were present: Freeholder James Kern, III, Freeholder Richard Gardner and Freeholder Jason Sarnoski. Also attending were County Administrator Alex Lazorisak, County Engineer Bill Gleba, County CFO Kim Francisco and County Counsel Joe Bell.

Mr. Sarnoski requested everyone remain standing following the salute to the flag. After the Pledge of Allegiance, Mr. Sarnoski noted the recent passing of two individuals with ties to the County. An employee of the Road Department stationed at the Alpha garage, Brian Solt, lost a long battle with cancer the previous evening. John Inscho, former chief of Mountain Lake Fire Company (1965-70), former member of Liberty Township Committee (1975-82), and father of current Liberty Township Mayor John Inscho, also passed away. Mr. Sarnoski presided over a moment of silence in honor of both men.

WHEREAS, the system of civilian control of the Armed Forces makes it essential that the future leaders of the Nation understand the history of military action and the contributions and sacrifices of those who conduct such actions; and

WHEREAS, the veterans of The American Legion, Carl D. Archer Post 528 of White Township have voiced strong support this resolution to emphasize the need to develop educational programs regarding the contributions of veterans to the country.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Warren County Board of Chosen Freeholders designates the week of November 10 through November 16, 2019, as "National Veterans Awareness Week" for the purpose of emphasizing educational efforts directed at elementary and secondary school students concerning the contributions and sacrifices of veterans, and encourages the people of the United States to observe National Veterans Awareness Week with appropriate educational activities.

Mr. Kern expressed gratitude to members of the Carl D. Archer post for the work they do every day – not just during Veteran's Awareness Week – and he thought passing those values on to the next generation was vital. With an all-volunteer military, Mr. Kern said, we need to recognize the sacrifices our veterans make for the sake of our country, and we need to preserve that through awareness.

Mr. Gardner joined Mr. Kern in thanking the Carl D. Archer post for bringing a heightened awareness to the selfless sacrifices of our veterans, their valor, and what their families go through. "It is really the military that protects our Constitutional Republic, and therefore, it is the great democracy that we have that, really, no other nation in the world has," Mr. Gardner said. He thought it was important to help raise awareness of how critical it is to have a strong military. We have many veterans in Warren County who have given a lot to their country, he said.

Mr. Sarnoski agreed with his colleagues, and was pleased to announce the County's next War Veterans Recognition Ceremony on Saturday, May 16, 2020. This will be the 17th ceremony honoring war veterans with ties to Warren County since the program's inception in 2004. So far, 2,197 men and women who served our nation during wartime, from World War I through the ongoing conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan, have been awarded a medal, lapel pin and certificate.

As we announce our next ceremony and encourage war veterans to apply for recognition (or their loved ones to submit the application on behalf of a veteran), Mr. Sarnoski said, tonight we wish to recognize a World War II serviceman who will be the 2,198th person to be honored in this program: Dominick "Don" DeBacco.

Don DeBacco was born in Gladstone, NJ in February 1926, and was about five years old when his family moved to Washington Borough, where he lived until moving in with his daughter and son-in-law earlier this year.

In 1944, 18-year-old Don DeBacco quit school during his senior year and enlisted. He sought to join the Army's Air Force but all the spots were filled, so he enlisted in the Army, entering active service on April 24, 1944 at Fort Dix, New Jersey. After basic training, Private First Class DeBacco headed across the Atlantic Ocean on a troop ship to Southampton, England, where he joined the 11th Armored Division of Gen. George Patton's Third Army as a gunner in a Sherman tank.

PFC DeBacco went into action in Northern France, noting, "All I knew was I had a job to do and I wanted to do it."

PFC DeBacco recalls that at Christmas, the cook was making their Christmas dinner when a battle broke out and the unit was ordered to move into action right away. He and his fellow soldiers ended up having their Christmas dinner at 4 o'clock in the morning.

Another time, they were in light tanks but encountered heavier German tanks. The tank he was in was hit, as were many of the others, resulting in the deaths of 16 American soldiers, while PFC DeBacco was wounded by shrapnel. The shrapnel was removed at a field hospital and he kept right on going, he said.

The 11th Armored Division pushed on, crossing the Rhine several times, and on May 8 became the first unit of the Third Army to meet up with the Soviet Red Army, our allies in battling the Germans.

PFC DeBacco assisted in the liberation of the Mauthausen concentration camp in May 1945, recalling that the scene "was terrible."

After Germany's surrender, PFC DeBacco said his unit was supposed to come home immediately, but instead was attached to another division, and it was six months more before he returned home.

After the war, he resumed his education, became a welder, and a teacher, as he taught industrial arts at Warren County schools.

He married his wife Shirley in 1948 and they had three children, Candy, with whom he now lives, Susan, and his son Donald, who died in a workplace accident some years ago. Shirley

passed away about four years ago, and Mr. DeBacco, now 93 years old, continued to live on his own until earlier this year.

Don DeBacco said he heard about Warren County's Veterans Recognition Program a long time ago, but thought "I didn't do anything better than anyone else." His daughter Candy Kloepfer nominated him this past summer, and after a review of the application by the Veterans Recognition Program Committee, the Warren County Board of Chosen Freeholders is pleased to present World War II Army veteran Don DeBacco with the Warren County Distinguished Military Service medal, along with a certificate and commemorative lapel pin.

PRESENTATION OF THE WARREN COUNTY DISTINGUISHED MILITARY SERVICE MEDAL TO DOMINICK "DON" DEBACCO, U.S. ARMY, WORLD WAR II.

The proclamation was accepted by Richard Larson, Commander, and Milly Rice, Adjutant, of The American Legion, Carl D. Archer Post 528 of White Township. Ms. Rice announced that three area schools would be hosting ceremonies in honor of Veterans Awareness Week: Belvidere High School on November 5, Allamuchy Township School on November 14, and Warren County Technical School on November 15. It is a great learning experience for the students.

After enjoying a standing ovation, Mr. DeBacco thanked the Freeholders, but said he was just doing his duty. He said it was a pleasure to serve his country.

The veterans returned to their seats, and then Milly Rice was honored for a different role, as secretary and display coordinator for the Warren County Shade Tree Commission.

Ms. Rice said after being secretary for 20 years, she was preparing to retire at the end of the year, and it was nice to be recognized this way. Mr. Gardner noted the small size of this commission (five members), and that it is in charge of Garret D. Wall Park.

CERTIFICATE – 2019 THOMAS M. KENNEDY "EXCELLENCE IN ACCESSIBILITY" TO OAKWOOD LANES

Mr. Kern, as liaison to the Department of Human Services, was pleased to present the certificate ensconced in a plaque to Advisory Council on Disabilities member Colleen O'Neill. He said he appreciated all efforts of those involved, saying this was an excellent example of a public and private partnership.

Mr. Gardner said Oakwood Lanes has been a family-run business for about six decades, they do a great job, and he was pleased to support this.

Ms. O'Neill was happy to accept, saying she has been working with people with disabilities for more than a decade, and worked with Oakwood Lanes throughout that time for parties and functions. "They have been so accommodating," she said.

Mr. Sarnoski said, "This is probably the best food you can get at a bowling alley," saying he was especially partial to their Turkey Club. He admired Oakwood Lanes, and every other business that received the Thomas M. Kennedy award over the years, for going the extra mile to be accommodating.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING AMENDMENT TO PURCHASE AGREEMENT FOR OPEN BLOCK 1202, LOT 2.02 IN HARDWICK TOWNSHIP

WHEREAS, on July 25, 2018 the Warren County Board of Chosen Freeholders ("County") authorized by Resolution 360-18 the purchase of Block 1202, Lots 2 and 2.02 in Hardwick Township ("Property") and entered into an Agreement to Purchase Property ("Agreement") on September 26, 2018 with the owner of the Property ("Seller"); and

WHEREAS, the County subsequently retained Eikon Planning and Design, LLC ("Eikon") to prepare a Preliminary Assessment/Site Investigation Report for the Property which identified three Areas of Concern (AOCs), the most significant of which was AOC-2 "Waste Piles / Dumping" on a portion of Lot 2 ("Main Dumping Area"); and

WHEREAS, because the Main Dumping Area is located on a steep slope which is difficult to access with heavy machinery, the Seller has indicated that it cannot afford to remove the buried solid waste material in accordance with NJDEP Solid Waste regulations at this time; and

WHEREAS, to facilitate the acquisition of the property for preservation purposes and to expedite the cleanup and removal of the buried solid waste material, both the County and Seller wish to modify the Agreement to include as follows:

- the County shall purchase only an approximately 11.8-acre portion of Lot 2 and Seller shall retain ownership of the approximately 3.6 acre area on Lot 2 around the Main Dumping Area as well as the entirety of Lot 2.02 which is approximately 4.1 acres; and

REPORTS AND COMMENTS

County Counsel Joe Bell had a few matters for Executive Session concerning W.M. and Courtroom #2.

County Engineer Bill Gleba advised that the 2019 resurfacing program is now underway. Concrete curb and drainage work is currently being done in the center of Belvidere.

County Planner Dave Dech recalled that a representative from the Census Bureau had attended the last Freeholder meeting, to emphasize the need for a complete count in 2020. Money is available (a grant of up to \$50,000) to form a county complete count committee. Much of the funding social service agencies rely on, including transportation, is determined by population counts. A Freeholder resolution will be required as part of the application to apply for the funding. He requested permission to put an application together, due October 31, 2019, and then have a resolution prepared for the November 13 meeting.

Mr. Francisco asked if a match was required. Mr. Dech said no. Mr. Kern asked how many people would comprise the committee. Mr. Dech said there was no set number, it would start with him and Human Services personnel, and grow from there. It was yet to be determined which of the two departments would spearhead the effort. Mr. Dech expected the group would meet monthly between now and next April. The goal is to get the word out - especially in the low response areas of Hackettstown, Washington and Phillipsburg – to respond to the census, preferably online. Mr. Kern said he could help.

Mr. Sarnoski said he was a little apprehensive at first, but if we're talking about transportation needs and traffic concerns of the future; and Human Services needs and immigration all roll into our complete count, he felt okay going forward with the initiative.

County CFO Kim Francisco had no report.

County Administrator Alex Lazorisak had only the position vacancy report for approval, about which there were no questions.

FREEHOLDER COMMENTS

Regarding the proposed transportation study, Mr. Kern reported that the application to the Highlands Council is in the governor review period. If the governor does not veto the minutes by mid-November (and he does not normally veto the minutes), Mr. Kern said that was a good sign.

Mr. Kern had attended the grand opening of a new brewery in Phillipsburg, and evidently, his fellow Freeholders had also visited the new business recently. Mr. Kern thought that was a great piece of economic development.

Regarding deer carcass removal, Mr. Kern asked if there had been any changes in terms of the state chipping in. Mr. Bell said when the issue first arose, it was considered an unfunded mandate. The power of that committee in Trenton is only to make recommendations, not implement them. He said it is the responsibility of the County at the present time. The State takes care of carcasses on its own roads. Mr. Gardner said they "dumped it onto the municipalities as well." There were a few more remarks regarding the volume of dead deer (300 per month on County roads), and that costs for removal have come down. Mr. Kern thought it might be appropriate to discuss the matter with the new League president when he is sworn at the end of the year, "and see if we can bubble that up," Mr. Kern said.

Mr. Gardner mentioned having attended the Family Promise Open House earlier in the day, saying it was a nice turnout. He said they do such a great job for people trying to get back on their feet in society.

The Mill in Asbury project is really moving along, Mr. Gardner said, with the exterior looking great. Mr. Sarnoski asked if there were offices on the second floor. "Not yet," Mr. Gardner said. The outside is done and windows are in, next comes the inside.

Mr. Sarnoski said he has been working with Hope Township Mayor Tim McDonough regarding traffic issues. "He's very optimistic about some plans we have to assist with Hope traffic concerns as it relates to trucks," Mr. Sarnoski said.

Mr. Sarnoski said we have been approached by a representative from the Jaindl organization about land preservation, and will be setting up a meeting in the near future.

A final note, Mr. Sarnoski encouraged all to go out an exercise their right to vote on Election Day, November 5.

CLOSING PUBLIC COMMENTS

Stan Prater of JCP&L provided an update on the Reliability Improvement Plan approved by the Board of Public Utilities last year. JCP&L has completed enhanced tree trimming out of the following substations: Port Murray, Mansfield, Alpha and Stewartsville. This is in addition to the company's four-year tree trimming cycle, along with hazard tree removal with Ash trees. Trip savers have also been installed. This is a smart-type of fuse that will isolate and pinpoint an outage. "Instead of having a 2,000 customer outage, we'll have maybe 200 customers out, which will isolate that area and we'll actually know where the outage is," Mr. Prater said.

Mr. Gardner said the tree service took care of Cemetery Hill Road and did a great job, but wanted Mr. Prater to know that Mountain View East appears to need a lot more work. Mr. Prater said this enhanced tree-trimming project focused on three-phase circuits, which take out a lot more customers, and may have bypassed some secondary circuits to get to the more impactful circuits. Mr. Sarnoski explained the program in a bit more technical detail.

There were no comments or questions from the press.
