Burke was appointed Warren County Prosecutor by Governor Chris Christie on March 15, 2012, serving as the County's chief law enforcement officer overseeing day-to-day operations of the Prosecutor's Office as well as coordinating the law enforcement efforts of 22 municipalities, 10 local police departments and the State Police within Warren County; and

WHEREAS, Richard T. Burke, one of seven children born to Agnes and William Burke, grew up in Hackettstown, attended St. Mary's School and Hackettstown High School, and remained there as he and his wife, Nancy, of 33 years, raised their children Caitlyn, Michael, and Eric, and where he has been a lifelong fixture and leader in the community, coaching his boys' football

teams, serving on the Hackettstown Board of Education, being active in his church, and participating in his high school's Alumni organization; and

WHEREAS, Richard T. Burke earned a Bachelor's degree from Gettysburg College and Juris Doctor degree from the University of Bridgeport, and prior to being named Prosecutor had a private law practice in Hackettstown for nearly 30 years, serving as the Planning Board Attorney for Belvidere, as well as a Municipal Prosecutor in several jurisdictions in Warren County; and

WHEREAS, among his many accomplishments throughout his term as Warren County Prosecutor, Richard T. Burke was instrumental in developing law enforcement protocols to address domestic/sexual violence and establishing the Domestic Violence Response Team and Sexual Assault Response Team; facilitated implementation of the geospatial mapping program for mapping schools in our County and created the County Wide Safe Schools Initiative unifying procedures between law enforcement agencies and school districts; and implemented the Rescue Task Force, which is a coordinated effort with volunteer fire and emergency medical services to assist law enforcement in the event of an active shooter or major incident in the County; and

WHEREAS, Richard T. Burke partnered with the Warren County Department of Human Services and the Coalition for Safe and Healthy Communities to form a leadership committee of stakeholders unifying county services that addresses prevention, education and treatment of substance abuse, and throughout his tenure has been active in mental health issues in Warren County;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Warren County Board of Chosen Freeholders honors Richard T. Burke for his years of distinguished service to Warren County, and wishes him well on the next phase of his career as Assistant Attorney General with the New Jersey Office of Public Integrity and Accountability.

Mr. Gardner said it was hard to believe Mr. Burke had been with us for nearly eight years. Many of the issues described in the proclamation were very difficult ones, and Mr. Burke has handled them with grace and dignity. Mr. Gardner also admired Mr. Burke for his open communication, keeping the Freeholders informed. He said it was an honor to bestow this proclamation, congratulated Mr. Burke for a job well done, and wished him the best in his new role.

Mr. Kern agreed with Mr. Gardner, adding that he admired Mr. Burke for being proactive in the community and forward-thinking. He was instrumental in implementing geo imaging in our schools, along with then Police Chief O'Reilly, to help keep potential targets safe. Mr. Kern said that leadership differentiated former Prosecutor Burke from his predecessors, and wished him all the best.

Mr. Sarnoski described Mr. Burke as a great steward of the taxpayers who understood fiscal challenges, yet was able to do his job to maximum effect. Mr. Sarnoski personally felt Mr. Burke's influence the most in the realm of opioid and addiction issues. "There is no doubt in my mind that Richard Burke has saved lives in Warren County," he said, noting he was instrumental in

getting narcan into the hands of first responders. He said Mr. Burke was very caring and compassionate toward those faced with addiction. Mr. Sarnoski could think of no one better suited to serve in a capacity of integrity and accountability than Richard Burke, and congratulated him with best wishes.

Former Prosecutor Burke thanked the Freeholders for the recognition. He noted he was born and raised in Warren County. He said one of the most rewarding parts of the job was going out into the community and building relationships through the schools, police departments, etc. He said that wouldn't have been possible without the Board's backing. Mr. Burke said not all discussions were agreeable - especially a few involving former Freeholder Ed Smith - but they were always interesting discussions, and he knew the Freeholders always made decisions that they felt were in the best interest of the community.

From an efficiency standpoint, during his tenure with the Freeholders' support, Prosecutors' offices were consolidated from four or five different locations into one building, the courthouse annex that formerly housed the library. A couple of years ago, the Freeholders authorized Mr. Burke to form a cybercrime unit, which enabled the office to do so much more in criminal investigations, as technology is everywhere today. He thanked the Freeholders again, and said to the audience, "You certainly are well served by these gentlemen here."

Those in attendance paying respect to Mr. Burke included Shawn Buskirk, Warren County Human Services Director, who thanked him very much on behalf of the department and said it had been a pleasure working with him; municipal court judge Ed Palmer, who said Mr. Burke did a fine job as prosecutor and always upheld the County's best interest; Warren County Surrogate Kevin O'Neill, who said he knew Mr. Burke through activities outside the public eye, including at church, and thought he "absolutely" belonged in an office that upholds public integrity; County Administrator Alex Lazorisak, who referred to Mr. Burke as a professional gentleman who was a pleasure to work with, and wished him luck; Undersheriff Ed Mirenda agreed with all sentiments expressed; and on behalf of the Public Safety Department, director Frank Wheatley said, "I couldn't ask for a better relationship with the Prosecutor's Office than I had with Mr. Burke.

"Thank you again, Dick," Mr. Sarnoski said, "You have a lot of friends in this room and in Warren County."

Mr. Gardner thanked all of the individuals being reappointed for continuing to serve. He said they are stalwart, dedicated individuals who help make Warren County work well.

With respect to the Community College, Mr. Kern said the Phi Theta Kappa honor fraternity awarded the recognition of having one of the best Board of Trustees in the nation at its national conference recently. "They're truly advocates of the students," he said. Peter Schmidt was voted as one of the highest-ranking members of the community college trustee community.

Mr. Sarnoski also recognized the Community College Selection Committee. While this time around it didn't have a lot of work to do, as there were no new applicants, but they do work to ensure the best people are selected for the job.

REPORTS AND COMMENTS

Assistant County Counsel Joe Bell IV said he had only one item for Executive Session regarding litigation.

County Engineer Bill Gleba reported on a few NJDOT matters. A public information session is scheduled to be held at the Washington Township municipal building the evening of November 21, regarding resurfacing of Route 31 slated for January of 2023.

A NJDOT meeting was held in Hackettstown regarding intersection improvements to Routes 57, 182 and 46. NJDOT is seeking a resolution of support from the County to improve intersections with CR517 (High Street), CR 604 (Willow Grove Road), East Avenue in Morris County, and Routes 57 and 182. The work will possibly be done in 2021.

Lastly, Mr. Gleba noted that the NJDOT paved CR 519 just north of the Route 57 intersection, which was extremely helpful. "They did come through for us," he said.

County Planner Dave Dech reported that in a letter received from the NJDEP on October 28, it granted approval of the recycling element that the Freeholders had adopted back in August.

Mr. Dech had attended a meeting the previous day regarding efforts of another ongoing study to restore passenger service on the Lackawanna Cutoff. Construction is taking place from Port Morris in Andover, and it may be extended to the Delaware Water Gap in 2021 or so. Representatives from the townships of Frelinghuysen and Knowlton were in attendance, as well as individuals from Pennsylvania. The next meeting on the matter is to take place in April.

"What more do they need to study?" Mr. Gardner asked, noting there have been many studies. The population there has grown, and we know Route 80 is not going to expand. Mr. Dech said the last environmental assessment was done about 10 years ago, and the cost of engineering needs to be updated. It is going through the federal process.

Mr. Sarnoski said he knew that Pennsylvania stakeholders support the project, but he wondered how our affected municipalities felt about it. Mr. Dech said there has been no official expressions of support, and he didn't want to speak for them, but they are certainly open to it.

Mr. Gardner said the main question was efficiency. "Is it going to be efficient enough to cut down traveling time for folks every day?" It would be another alternative to traveling on Route 80; it boils down to ridership and the cost of construction and operation.

Mr. Kern said this was eerily familiar to a question before the federal government a few years ago regarding the Route 78 corridor. The feds said there was simply no money; study all you want. Here we are seeking more rail service, yet there are trains out west not being used. "It's very

frustrating," he said.

County CFO Kim Francisco had nothing to report.

County Administrator Alex Lazorisak had only the vacancy report, which contained nothing out of the ordinary, and reminded everyone that the Board's next meeting will be on Tuesday, November 26 due to the Thanksgiving holiday.

FREEHOLDER COMMENTS

Mr. Kern congratulated Mr. Sarnoski on his reelection as Freeholder, saying he looked forward to continue to working with him.

The State Department of Human Services Commissioner will be at the Pohatcong Walmart on November 15 to support the SNAP effort. Mr. Kern planned to attend, as well as staff members of our County Human Services Department and NORWESCAP. Information on different services will be provided.

Mr. Kern reported that he and Mr. Dech met with Lisa Plevin and Maryjude Haddock-Weilerwit of the Highlands Council the previous week. He thought it was a productive meeting, not only about the identified traffic study but also to plan a countywide meeting to inform Warren County municipalities of the grant resources available through the Highlands, to update their master plans. The goal would be to invite each municipality's mayor and planning chair. "They're looking forward to continuing to work with us," Mr. Kern said of the Highlands Council.

The Technology & Transparency Task Force has a couple of upcoming meetings with vendors regarding website production, so Mr. Kern was pleased about this positive momentum.

Mr. Gardner congratulated Mr. Sarnoski on his victory. Mr. Gardner said he looked forward to the first meeting of the recently formed Bicentennial Cultural and Heritage Advisory Board the following week. He was excited to kick things off and start to focus on the future, culminating in the year 2025. The group will reflect on all the County has acquired and its meaning, and how to protect, preserve and market it.

Regarding deer, Mr. Gardner cautioned that they are very active right now, traveling across roadways. He said he had spoken with the NJ Farm Bureau president, who was trying to have dialog with Fish & Game on how to alleviate the problem. We pay a lot for vehicle insurance, he said, and there are more deer killed on the road by vehicles than there are from hunting. According to an infrared count by the NJFB, the deer population is five to six times what it should be. Mr. Sarnoski thought part of the problem was that there are fewer hunters than in years past, and it is hard for them to find land on which hunting is permitted. There are more liability issues today. "It's a difficult problem and there are no easy answers," Mr. Gardner said. He just wanted to urge caution.

Mr. Sarnoski thanked his colleagues for congratulating him on his reelection as Freeholder.

He thanked everyone who went out and voted, and congratulated other winners, including the Sheriff and 23rd and 24th District Assemblymen. He expressed appreciation to all opponents, as well, for participating in the process. He said it is not an easy thing to run for office, and he admires all who step up to be a part of the process.

The Warren County Hall of Fame Dinner was coming up on November 16, with former Freeholder Ed Smith being one of the honorees. Mr. Sarnoski looked forward to it, and encouraged people to attend if any tickets remained. He said it was a great night for a good cause, with proceeds going to Warren County Community College.

CLOSING PUBLIC COMMENTS

Aaron Hyndman of Hackettstown approached the Freeholders in his role as vice Chair of the Warren County Mental Health Board. He said the Mental Health Board is engaged in ongoing dialog with the State Department of Health regarding the fact that there are no in-patient beds in Warren County for people in crisis since the closure of the in-patient psychiatric unit at St. Luke's Warren Hospital. There are a couple of beds for us in Newton Hospital, but if people in crisis cannot get there, they tend to be sent quite far, to either Camden or Gloucester County. This is not only difficult for the patient, but also problematic for family members who wish to visit. Further, commitment court hearings are involved, and referencing agenda item H-3 (Resolution 557-19), Mr. Hyndman noted, "We're footing the bill" to pay an attorney for all the travel time to see patients on court dates.

Mr. Sarnoski said he was aware of the issue and appreciated the Mental Health Board's focus on this. Mental Health has been deemed a top priority need in Warren County. "We are deficient in these services... it's certainly something we need to focus on," said Mr. Sarnoski. He said St. Luke's Warren had entered into a new partnership with Robert Wood Johnson - St. Barnabus, and Karen Kubert, former Warren County Human Services Director, serves on St. Luke's Warren Board of Directors. Mr. Sarnoski said he had spoken to Ms. Kubert about this matter, and was confident she would continue to press the issue in the context of this merger.

Mr. Sarnoski noted Mr. Hyndman's tenure on the Mental Health Board and said he appreciated his volunteerism. "Anything you can do to help that organization to find beds; find alternative resources in Warren County for mental health, is much appreciated, and I support that," Mr. Sarnoski said. Mr. Gardner said if the Mental Health Board can put some numbers together, perhaps the Freeholder Board could write a letter of support to St. Luke's. As far as numbers, Mr. Hyndman said that is the main focus of the Mental Health Board right now; it is in the process of drafting a formal letter to the State seeking clarification, as they were not getting satisfactory answers from the State representative.

Dialog continued, and it was acknowledged that St. Luke's had not fulfilled its obligation. Former Prosecutor Richard Burke said they had argued against St. Luke's decision to close the unit, and they said they would provide outpatient beds. He suggested going back to the minute of that meeting. Mr. Hyndman said the State is not satisfied with St. Luke's. Mr. Sarnoski said he would bring it up with Ms. Kubert.

Purchasing Director Chris Pessolano reported on September's annual surplus auction. Close to \$60,000 was brought in, with the involvement of several towns, and they seemed to appreciate being included. Mr. Pessolano publicly thanked Public Information Director Art Charlton for taking photos, and the Roads Division for its cooperation.

Ryan McDonald of Liberty Township congratulated Mr. Sarnoski on his reelection, and then broached the topic of recreational marijuana. He noted that Assemblyman Hal Wirths voted no on recreational marijuana last year, saying if democrats were truly serious about social justice, they would allow citizens to grow it at home, as they do in Vermont. As medical marijuana patient, Mr. McDonald said homegrown would be beneficial for a number of reasons.

"Also about a year ago, our State went after microbreweries," Mr. McDonald continued, which inspired him to look into Hobby Laws. He thought Hobby Laws might be a great avenue for marijuana. He asked Mr. Sarnoski why he was opposed to recreational marijuana, and if he would be willing to team up with Assemblyman Wirths on the issue.

Having been involved with the Addiction Task Force, Mr. Sarnoski said he had worked with former Prosecutor Burke on the issue, and many problems arose in Colorado after legalization; it creates a black market. New Jersey is the most densely populated state, so impaired driving is more of a challenge here. Mr. Sarnoski said he had no problem with medical marijuana for true medical purposes if proper procedures were followed. He thought medical marijuana should be more accessible and affordable. He thought New Jersey was the only state to tax it. "For those reasons I support the medical side of it to a degree, and I oppose the recreational side," Mr. Sarnoski said.

Theresa Chapman of Harmony provided an update on the local warehouse issue. She had attended the White Township Planning Board meeting the prior evening, at which Jaindl presented a new proposal, for 3.5 million square feet of warehouse space. She said she researched it a bit, and found out that from 2013 to now, more 41 million square feet of warehousing went up in the Lehigh Valley. If this 3.5 million square feet installation is approved, then added to the 3.8 million square feet for the Bridgepoint 78 project underway, plus 1.2 million square feet for the Franklin Township proposal, that totals 8.5 million square feet of warehouse space coming to Warren County in a year or two; twenty percent of Lehigh Valley's total.

Ms. Chapman then provided some statistics she had compiled on Lehigh Valley. She said it was the third most populous metropolitan area in Pennsylvania, with a population of 842,000, and three historical cities: Allentown, Bethlehem and Easton. It is also home to an international airport; minor league baseball, football, and hockey teams; the PPL Center; SteelStacks; 13+ major universities; at least three major hospitals, and more.

The townships of Hope, Knowlton, Frelinghuysen, Hardwick and Harmony have all passed resolutions opposing this project. "Three hundred seventy-six homes – families' lives – will be forever altered," Ms. Chapman said, having counted that many driveways on Route 519 from Route 57 to Route 80. She also counted seven developments along the way, six of which had only one way in and out; six churches; five cemeteries; four schools; and more than 54 businesses that

have direct access onto Route 519. "We are not Lehigh Valley," Ms. Chapman said, "and we are pleading with you to keep us from looking like the outskirts of Lehigh Valley."

Nancy Mason of Belvidere thanked Mr. Kern for meeting with the Highlands Council to work toward helping municipalities review their master plans. "This is of the utmost urgency, especially after attending last night's meeting in White Township," Ms. Mason said, "They have a dire need of help." She said they need help now, not one or two months from now. She said it was obvious the White Township Planning Board doesn't know what to do at this point. Even though the area was zoned as industrial, Ms. Mason said it needed to stay in the farming community, and by that she did not mean industrial, intensive livestock farming. She asked the Board to please keep those things in mind.

Butch Van Setters of Harmony said he had also attended the meeting the previous evening. "It was just total confusion," he said of the Planning Board. He said he was sitting in the front row along with Jaindl attorneys and experts, "And they were virtually laughing at White Township Planning Board," Mr. Van Setters said, who found it very embarrassing and upsetting.

There were no comments or questions from the press.
